



Invisibilised Labor


If unpaid household labor were included, the U.S. GDP would be 26-39% higher - Bureau of Economic Analysis

Global **unpaid labor** is estimated to be 15% of GDP (on par with manufacturing), or 27% of GDP with opportunity costs - OECD

Informal employment accounts for 15% out
of GDP in advanced economies, and 35% in
low and middle-income countries. - IMF

CARE WORK

IN THE U.S., 37.1 MILLION PEOPLE PROVIDED UNPAID ELDER CARE IN 2021-22, VALUED AT APPROXIMATELY \$600 BILLION PER YEAR — EQUIVALENT TO THE ENTIRE AUTO-PARTS SECTOR

Lessons from Organizing

- Base-building is the art of friendship. It takes years of door-knocking and meal-sharing to build trust. Consistency is everything.
- 2. Coalition-building across labor, immigrant rights, LGBTQ, healthcare, criminal justice reform, and women's rights movements is key for strategizing campaigns that win.
- Build your theory on organizing. Don't put theory before organizing - or you will split up into ideological factions. Solidarity across differences is how you pass legislation. Work with your enemies.
- Leadership development means passing the torch to other organizers, to support bringing the most marginalized voices to the policy table. You don't have to personally fight every fight. Commitment to the greater movement also means letting go.
- Societal change happens slowly, with great sacrifice. But it does come. Keep fighting. There is power in people, over money and elite capture. We can win. We have a duty to win.

Platform of Affordability

- Rent freeze on stabilized units
- Fare-free city buses
- Universal public childcare
- \$30 minimum wage by 2030
- City-run grocery stores "public option for food"
- Corporate tax raised to 11.5% (NJ level), 2% income surtax on incomes over \$1 million

BASIC INCOME

Silvia Federici and Selma James argued for basic income for reproductive labor.

> Wages for Housework challenged wage-labor system as sole measure of value.

> They support UBI if it recognizes reproductive labor, not erases it. It should not replace public services, but complement welfare systems.



Finland UBI Pilot (2017-2018)

2000 unemployed people, €560/month for 2 years

Not open to full-time caregivers. Mirrors market-centric model equating "productive" work with waged formal employment.

Evaluated labor market outcomes, not time-use patterns.





1970s - Mincome experiment in Manitoba, Canada. Negative Income Tax pilots in U.S.

1982-today - Alaska Permanent Fund - redistributed oil revenues

2000s-2010s - Brazil's Bolsa Familia, Mexico's Programa de Bienestar, Ecuador's Buen Vivir

2011-2016 - India's UBI pilot for rural women with SEWA (Self Employed Women's Association)

2016 - Switzerland's referendum on UBI (rejected but sparked debate).
Netherlands and Finland launched UBI-style pilots for the unemployed.


2020-present - COVID-19 emergency cash programs, stimulus checks and Child Tax Credit revived global interest in UBI.

Spain and Korea rolled out partial basic incomes.

Mayors for a Guaranteed Income (U.S.) - Coalition of over 100 cities testing local UBI pilots, spearheaded by former Stockton mayor Michael Tubbs.

Tech & UBI - Andrew Yang, Sam Altman, and Elon Musk advocate for UBI as a response to AI-driven job loss. Critics argue this "Silicon Valley UBI" avoids addressing exploitation or corporate taxation.
